IDENTITY AUTHORITIES AND USERS	 Government: National identity authorities and government agencies managing population registers, civil registers, healthcare programs, biometrics programs, registration and enrolment, national identity card schemes, operations, processes and infrastructure for national identity management and delivery of e-Government services. Public sector users of identity include government agencies responsible for home affairs, public security, law enforcement, border management, elections, taxation and finance, communication and information technology, labour, social security, health care and social protection. Commercial: Telecom operators, financial institutions, insurance companies, health care providers, agricultural cooperatives, airlines, transport operators and enterprises that need to manage the identity of their employees or customers.
INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCIES	International organizations that include global and regional development banks, international development agencies and private foundations providing financing for social protection initiatives, national infrastructure projects, capacity building and technical advisory services to help accelerate Africa's socio-economic development.
